Jackson was a successful municipal politician – held a seat in council, served as reeve of the village (1871-1876 and 1877-1881) and later as Mayor. Served a term as warden of York County; was Secretary and treasurer of the North York Agricultural Society for over 20 years; was President of the Newmarket Mechanics' Association for many years; and was credited with the purchase and development of the Newmarket Fairgrounds.
